The 2002 Schweiger Cabernet already shows a surprising elegance emerging through some brisk opening tannin.

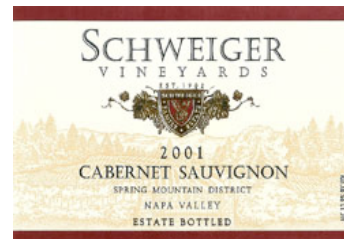
